Town Hall 'loses' Fender Lane data



As usual on Fender Lane - not a cyclist in sight...but the Town Hall has again delayed the long-awaited the 'consultation'.

The hardly-used Fender Lane cycle route has become a farce, after enquiries by local councillors revealed key data has been 'lost'.

Last month, our local Facebook page (News for Moreton and Saughall Massie) was seen by 3,140 people.

Some of that was due to the online 'poll' we held on the Fender Lane cycle route. 71% of people who took part said the cycle lanes had increased journey times and congestion.

Earlier, we had asked for the data collected by the Council BEFORE the cycle lane was installed, to see if had made any difference. In a surprising response, the Town Hall revealed the data had been 'lost' and so no meaningful comparison could be provided.

We have now met with the Council's new Director of Neighbourhoods and again raised concerns about this route, and the value to the taxpayer of the £204, 000 it cost.

The RNIB has also raised concerns about the 'floating' bus stops, which force bus users into the path of cyclists, such as Fender Lane.

The Council has now appointed consultants Mott MacDonald, at yet more cost, to review the scheme.

We understand a 'consultation' will also start in June. We'll share details of this on our facebook page and in our email updates to residents to make sure you have your say.

Wirral told to change the way it brings in 20mph zones

In our previous newsletter, we reported how Labour Councillors had voted against our call to pause the roll out of 20mph zones across Wirral.

Since then, the Department for Transport has issued new quidance to all councils, including Wirral.

This says councils should prioritise 20mph restrictions in areas with the most number of crashes and around schools.

At the same time, the guidance

says that new schemes should be able to demonstrate public support.

This was one of the failings highlighted by residents with Wirral's approach - few people were consulted or even aware of the proposals.

We have written to the Council's

Chief Executive asking for confirmation that the new guidance will be followed.

In a separate move, the Chairman of the Saughall Massie Conservation Area Society has asked that 20mph limits are introduced in the village.

NEW! Which local roads and pavements are being repaired over the next 12 months...

In March, councillors approved the programme for highways repairs over the next 12 months.

As part of £4.1m to be spent on highways across Wirral, we can report that the following local roads are scheduled to be resurfaced:

Berrylands Road, Berrylands Close, Bramble Way, Burden Road, Huxley Close, Meadfoot Road and Pasture Road.

While these are some of the roads nominated by your councillors, other roads have been assessed by Highways Officers

as not being a priority for this year.
